

It will feature three storybooks with live music performed by a narrator and the Toledo Symphony. The stories and music will go together to tell each story in a fun way.








The concert will be at the **Peristyle Theatre** inside the **Toledo Museum of Art**. I can park in the free parking lot or be dropped off at one of the entrances

signs to help me find it.



Activities will include crafts from the **Toledo Symphony League, Toledo Museum of Art, and Live Arts Toledo Staff.** I will also see a resource table from **Lucas County Board of Developmental Disabilities.**

These activities will be a lot of fun but can be loud. I can take a break by leaving to a quieter space or I can grab **sensory headphones!**





If I finish early, I can look at the art museum before the concert begins. If I arrive closer to **3:00 PM**, I can go straight into the concert hall, where an **usher will help me find my seat.**



When I arrive, I will **show my physical or digital ticket** to a **friendly usher** who can help me find my way.

When I enter the hall, I will see the stage, two large screens, and many musicians with their instruments. I will sit and wait for the concert to start.



When the musicians finish tuning, the conductor and narrator will walk on stage, and I can **clap to welcome them**. As the music begins, the **narrator will read the stories while the orchestra plays**.



When each story ends, I can
clap with everyone else.
Clapping lets the musicians
know that **I enjoyed their**
performance and helps
show appreciation for their
hard work.





When the **concert is finished**, I can **stay for a Q&A session** and **meet some of the musicians**. It will be a fun way to learn more about their instruments and the stories from the concert.
